ENGLISH MAJOR-LEVEL COURSES DOBBS FERRY SPRING 2023

CULTURAL RHETORICS

MONDAY 11:40-2:30

This course explores the connection between rhetoric, identity, & diverse forms of communicative practices. Students learn about what rhetoric is, and its relation to interdisciplinary areas such as critical race theory, ethnic studies, gender studies, and disability studies, and more. Materials will include readings, film, and other audio and visual media.






SCIENCE FICTION | WEDNESDAY 2:50-5:40

Science fiction attempts to imagine the future by detecting and understanding the patterns of the world today. Science fiction is therefore as much about the present as the future; and above all else science fiction is about the perils and adventures of change—the changes that the world, society, & humanity itself will undergo as a result of trends in contemporary culture, arts, science, and technology. Materials will include short stories and visual media/film.

ENGLISH MAJOR-LEVEL COURSES DOBBS FERRY SPRING 2023

MURDER, MYSTERY & SUSPENSE THURSDAY: 11:40 - 2:30 This course will trace the development of the murder-mystery for re-

ment of the murder-mystery genre from the 19th century to present-day, with a focus on the question of why stories of this genre are so interesting to so many people.





SHAKESPEARE WEDNESDAY: 11:40 - 2:30

An exploration of select dramatic works by William Shakespeare. Students will be guided through the action and dialogue of the plays, and will be encouraged to feel for the power and meaning of these plays that have been performed and valued around the globe for hundreds of years. 315

ADVANCED CREATIVE WRITING TUESDAY: 11:40 - 2:30

A continuation of the skills practiced in earlier creative writing courses at Mercy College. Students with no previous creative writing experience can join with professor's permission.




ENGLISH MAJOR-LEVEL COURSES

BRONX CAMPUS SPRING 2023

CARIBBEAN LITERATURE THURSDAY 11:40-2:

This course surveys authors from the islands of the Caribbean. Some issues that might be explored include the writer's choice of language (e.g. the language of the colonizer versus national language); the rising voice of Caribbean women carving out distinctive space for themselves; the significance and spiritual force of carnival; Negritude; and the writer in exile.





MODERN AMERICAN | FICTION |

MONDAY 6:15-9:05

Modern fiction emerged in the early twentieth century to form a new type of storytelling, one that would speak true to the new modern world, one that refused to follow old-world rules and old-world traditions. Students in this class will explore a variety of diverse modern fiction, and will consider the relationship between modern fiction and the modern world, society, and culture.

TALES OF NEW YORK CITY WEDNESDAY 11:40-2:30

New York City, one of the great cities of the world, is a city of diversity, energy, commerce, community, skyscrapers, art, music, and more. NYC is also a city of contradictions: poverty and wealth, success and failure, crowdedness and loneliness, joy and sadness, greed and generosity, reality and illusion. This course will explore NYC by reading works set in NYC, works that illuminate the experiences of New York and of New Yorkers.

ENGLISH MAJOR-LEVEL COURSES ONLINE SPRING 2023

INTRO TO ENGLISH STUDIES ASYNCHRONOUS

The intro course for all English majors. An exploration of what English majors do during their college studies, and of why it's worth doing. Professional and personal outcomes will be explored. Replaces ENGL 200



SURVEY ENGLISH LITERATURE II ASYNCHRONOUS C

A survey of the traditions in structure and content that shaped English literature from the Restoration through the modern era of the 20th century.

LGBTQ+ LIT & EXPERIENCES ASYNCHRONOUS

A study of significant literature and experiences of LGBTQ+ culture, and the major concepts and political issues that shape gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, and queer experiences through literary and cultural productions.



ENGLISH MAJOR-LEVEL COURSES ONLINE **SPRING 2023**

HIP HOP LIT & CULTURE ZOOM: TUESDAYS: 11:40-2:30

Hip Hop started as a form of Black expression in the Bronx, NY and morphed into a global, multi-cultural phenomenon. This course introduces students to hip hop culture (music, videos, stories, essays, films, etc) and examines some of the major concepts and issues that shape the culture.



SPORT LITERATURE ASYNCHRONOUS That a so many

yet so few have come to terms with the meaning of sport. This course will explore, among other things, the meaning and cultural relevance of sport, along with the way that we make meaning of sport through narrative conventions.



We will explore work of various Latino writers. The novel will be the main focus of study, but various short stories, essays, and poems will also be examined and discussed in order to trace the evolution of Latino literature and examine the critical issues raised by these works.



ENGLISH MAJOR-LEVEL COURSES ONLINE **SPRING 2023**

WORLD LITERATURE ZOOM: MON+WED: 10:05 - 11:25

This course will study diverse literary texts (e.g. stories, drama, poetry) from around the world. Students will question what might we learn about the world, and about ourselves, from encountering world literature.





MONSTERS NASYNCHRONOUS

Students in this course will read classic and modern stories that explore notions of monsters and monstrosities from the perspective of the monster and of the creator. Types of monsters will be considered: for example Human, Beast, and Scientific. Cultural & social factors will be explored too.

SEMINAR IN LIT RESEARCH & WRITING **ASYNCHRONOUS**
